

A Letter from the Board of Trustees

Dear RWS Family and Friends,

It goes without saying that 2019-20 was a year like no other. While it was truly a transformational one for RWS, I cannot reflect on our 2019-20 accomplishments and milestones without first acknowledging the unprecedented events of 2020, specifically the COVID-19 global pandemic and the social justice movement that continues to sweep our nation.

A Community Response

When Virginia's governor mandated that schools close in mid March due to COVID 19, RWS responded immediately. The Board established a Core Response Team made up of task forces focusing on pedagogy, finances, communication, and community life. Leaders from each task force met weekly to ensure efficient and timely information was shared across all realms of the school. This model proved to be very effective in managing the crisis for RWS.

Without hesitation our faculty rose to the challenge, developing and delivering a distance learning program to allow students to finish the academic year. Our administration worked tirelessly to stay up-to-date with the latest recommendations and requirements from the Centers for Disease Control, the Virginia Departments of Health, Education and Social Services, and the Virginia Council on Private Education. Our administrative team also creatively adapted existing administrative processes and communication protocols to continue to support the faculty and serve both current and prospective families via virtual platforms.

The Board of Trustees met every week from March through June to ensure the school remained in good financial health and that our mission was not compromised. We actively engaged with experts from our accrediting bodies, the Association of Waldorf Schools of North America, the Southeastern Association of Independent Schools, and other private education clearinghouse organizations like Independent Schools Management, to gather and implement best practice responses to the pandemic.

With patience and grace, our parent community rallied to support the school and their students in new ways of learning. They worked collaboratively with RWS staff and faculty providing input, feedback, and suggestions for ways to improve the virtual learning experience.

Finally, our community also gave generously to our Sun Fund appeal, donating more than \$18,000 to support RWS families facing unexpected and significant financial hardships due to the pandemic.

A Community Value

Spring 2020 also marked the beginnings of a nationwide groundswell of protests and calls for change to address long standing racial injustice and deep systemic oppression of people of color. Such matters of social justice are central to our RWS community values. We believe in the respect for basic human rights, diversity of humankind, and that inclusivity and equality are moral and educational imperatives.

At the beginning of the school year, the Board established a joint Board and Faculty College Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee to affirm our commitment to the ongoing process of learning, listening, and deepening our understanding of diversity, equity and inclusion, both in theory and in practice as it lives in our school and our community.

We are grateful to be on a path towards making RWS an inclusive community where everyone feels respected, connected, honored, and valued.

A Community Celebration

Looking back, one of the highlights of last year was participating in the worldwide celebration of 100 years of Waldorf education. In 1919, the human-centered approach of Waldorf education emerged in Stuttgart, Germany following the devastation of World War I.

To honor the 100th anniversary, RWS students of all ages participated in a postcard exchange with other Waldorf schools around the world, our community joined together in a special Waldorf100 celebration, and our 7th and 8th graders marked the milestone by completing an incredible 5-day, 100-mile bike ride along the C&O Towpath in Maryland.

Now more than ever the founding principles of Waldorf education will help us respond to the cultural transformations that are happening across our nation and around the world.

A Community Loss

In February 2020, our school's founder John Moses passed away ending more than thirty years of attentive service and deep commitment to RWS and its mission. John was the only remaining "lifetime trustee" listed in the school's original Articles of Incorporation.

He rarely missed a Board meeting in three decades and remained active right up until the weeks preceding his death. John cared deeply for the students and the faculty and was a tireless promoter of the value of Waldorf education. John's final words to me were "Please send my best wishes to the Board and don't forget about the high school." It was his dream to grow RWS to include a high school. We will honor John's legacy, holding on to this dream, as we continue to strive for long-term sustainability and eventual growth.

A Community's Achievements

As Trustees, our main focus is to establish sound financial management policies to ensure RWS has adequate resources to provide its current educational programming while simultaneously securing a sustainable future. Despite the unprecedented challenges and significant hardships faced in 2019-20, and because of the dedication and hard work of the Board, Faculty, and Administration, there is also much good news to share and a number of accomplishments to be celebrated.

Last year, RWS:

- Achieved a record enrollment of 151 students.
- Ended the year with a substantial financial surplus enabling RWS to continue to build financial reserves.
- Completed a successful Annual Fund campaign surpassing our goal by 10% and raised additional Sun Fund contributions to provide support to our families impacted by COVID-19.
- Received \$200,000 in capital campaign grant monies from the Mary Morton Parsons Foundation, the R.E.B. Foundation, and The William H. John G. Emma Scott Foundation to help fund Phase 2 of the Roof Replacement project which was completed this past spring.
- Continued our work toward acquiring dual accreditation with Association of Waldorf Schools of North America (AWSNA) and Southern Association of Independent Schools (SAIS).
- Established a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee to support the conscious awareness surrounding these matters as they live in our school community.
- Graduated the Class of 2020, our eleventh 8th grade class, in a creatively crafted commencement ceremony, streamed virtually to allow the larger community to participate.

Looking back on it all leaves me with mixed emotions. The COVID-19 pandemic robbed us of so many of our most beloved end of year experiences – classroom experiential learning, class plays, spring field trips, school assemblies, community socials, May Faire, Music Night, sports banquets, in-person commencement exercises, and the like. Yet despite these losses, we made it through to end the year intact and with a sense of accomplishment and I could hardly be prouder of our entire community. Even when we could not learn, celebrate, and come together in ways that we were used to, we overcame those challenges with innovative solutions and new ways of supporting each other. This is what it means to be a community, a family.

Perhaps the strongest emotion is gratitude. We could not have made it through this past year without the support of our entire RWS community. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I extend my deepest heartfelt thanks to you – our parents, families, friends, faculty, staff, and alumni for the generosity, dedication, and support you continue to offer to RWS.

This coming year promises to be a challenging one filled with uncertainty, but I am confident that as a community and with your continued support, we will be able to face whatever lies ahead. We will look back on this unique time as one that brought us even closer together.

Forever in Our Hearts

John Moses, March 15, 1939 - February 5, 2020

In February 2020, we lost our dear friend and school founder, John Moses.

Richmond Waldorf School was originally formed in 1988 as the Trinity School located in the home of John and Sara Moses. John, who had eight years of Waldorf teaching experience, and Sara were determined to provide a Waldorf education for their two elementary aged children. With their pioneering spirits, they brought the Waldorf impulse to Richmond, Virginia.

John had been involved in establishing and working at Waldorf schools around the world, including schools in Tubingen, Germany, New York, and Washington DC prior to starting RWS.

Upon retiring from his fulltime professional career working in Finance for the Department of State as well as the Commonwealth of Virginia, John became increasingly active at RWS faithfully attending festivals, assemblies, and community socials. Additionally, for a period, he served as a substitute teacher and aftercare assistant. For many years, John also led a weekly Anthroposophical study group for the greater Richmond community.

In addition, for more than three decades after founding the first iteration of RWS, John remained a dedicated member of the Board of Trustees actively contributing to the longterm health and well-being of the school. With his guiding wisdom and big heart, John was highly respected by his fellow trustees and the entire RWS community. John will forever be a part of Richmond Waldorf School, and is deeply missed.


